100TH ANNIVERSARY

Explore the major milestones of the Suffrage Movement in this timeline — from within the first World Anti-Slavery Convention in 1840 through the Nineteenth Amendment to the Constitution, granting women the right to vote on August 26, 1920.

1830S | IROQUOIS WOMEN EXERT A PROFOUND INFLUENCE ON SUFFRAGISTS VISION OF EQUALITY

1840 | FIRST WORLD ANTI-SLAVERY CONVENTION

1848 | FIRST WOMEN'S RIGHTS CONVENTION IN SENECA FALLS, NY

'51-'61 | WOMEN'S RIGHTS CONVENTIONS HELD ACROSS THE NATION

1863 | THE WOMEN'S LOYAL NATIONAL LEAGUE IS ESTABLISHED IN THE COOPER UNION IN NEW YORK CITY

1866 | FOUNDING OF THE AMERICAN EQUAL RIGHTS ASSOCIATION

1868 | RATIFICATION OF THE 14TH AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

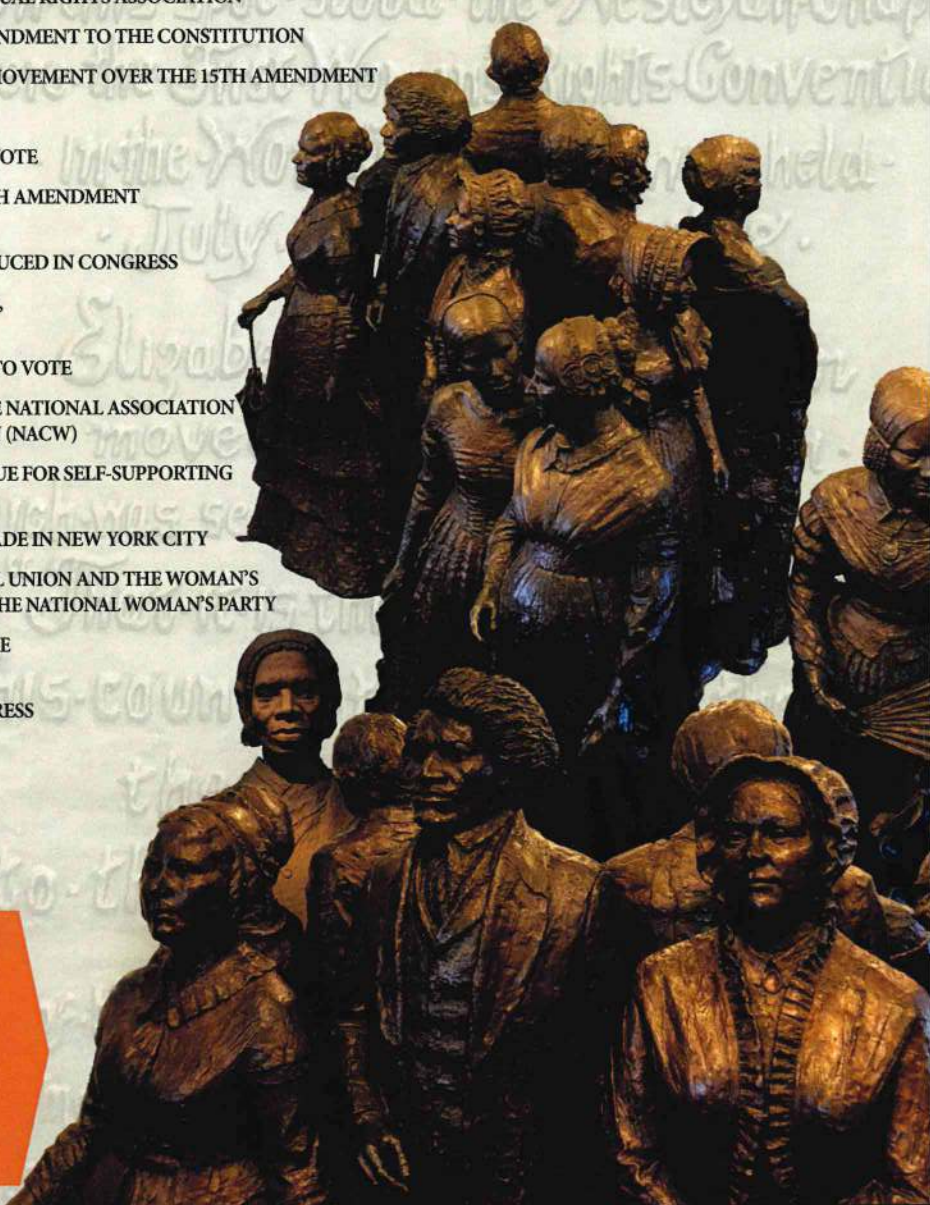
1917 | EIGHT STATES GRANT WOMEN THE RIGHT TO VOTE

1919 | THE NINETEENTH AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PASSES BOTH HOUSES OF CONGRESS

1920 | THE NINETEENTH AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION SIGNED INTO LAW

1924 | THE INDIAN CITIZENSHIP ACT OF 1924 GRANTS CITIZENSHIP TO NON-CITIZEN INDIANS BORN WITHIN U.S. TERRITORY

On Nov. 5, 1918, South Dakota men approved a state constitutional amendment giving women the right to vote in state elections. Six previous attempts to approve women's suffrage failed. The U.S. Congress passed a suffrage amendment in 1919.



This life-size bronze statues of the "The First Wave" is of the five women who organized and a few of the men who came in support of social, political, and religious equality for women on July 19 and 20th 1848 - the First Women's Rights Convention held at the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel in Seneca Falls, NY. Also in attendance were Fredrick Douglas and Harriet Tubman.

They debated and voted on the grievances presented in the Declaration of Sentiments, a document of the discriminations: most women could not vote, own property, attend college, or work professionally.
